## MIDDLE SCHOOL FORESTRY OCCUPATION

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The purpose of the Forestry Occupation is to gain a greater understanding of the physical and biological features of the forests of southern New England. The Occupation includes aspects of forest management, history, botany, contemporary forest management techniques, and a "citizen science" field study. The unit culminates with the students collecting data on IOm x IOm plots established in the forests of Millstream Farm; these findings and data are uploaded into a regional database for participation in the Harvard Forest Program, Our Changing Forests. The ultimate goal of this Occupation, addressed over a three-year cycle, is to develop a comprehensive forest management plan for the forest at Millstream Farm. The key lessons for year one are as follows:
